Right on the money: GENIVAR's award winning waterfront project is immortalized on a commemorative \$100 bank note

If leading the charge on the successful completion of Port of Spain's International Waterfront Centre project *and* winning Leonard Prize for Project Management from the *Grands Prix du génie-conseil québécois* didn't already put GENIVAR on the map, this latest coup certainly will!

A new one hundred dollar bill (valued at approximately \$20 CAD), depicting Port of Spain's International Waterfront Centre project the was launched in commemoration of the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) that took place November 27th -29th, 2009, and will remain in circulation.

A true honour

The Central Bank of Trinidad and Tobago, with the approval of the Ministry of Finance, determines the design and characteristics of the country's notes and coins. To be depicted on a banknote is indeed an honour as well as a strong indication that the Waterfront Centre is viewed as a significant and valued symbol whose contribution to the country's heritage and physical environment is expected to last for years to come.

About the International Waterfront Centre

With a view to revitalizing the waterfront in the country's capital Port of Spain, the goal of the International Waterfront Centre was to open the center town on to the waterfront and to improve the urban quality of the environment. The project consisted of building two 26-story prestige office towers and a four star 885,000 ft² Hyatt hotel with 428 rooms, a 55,000 ft² convention centre, commercial lots and an 800 space parking structure.

The opening of the CHOGM was launched by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, who addressed the heads of government at the National Academy for the Performing Arts, which, incidentally, is also one of GENIVAR's projects.
